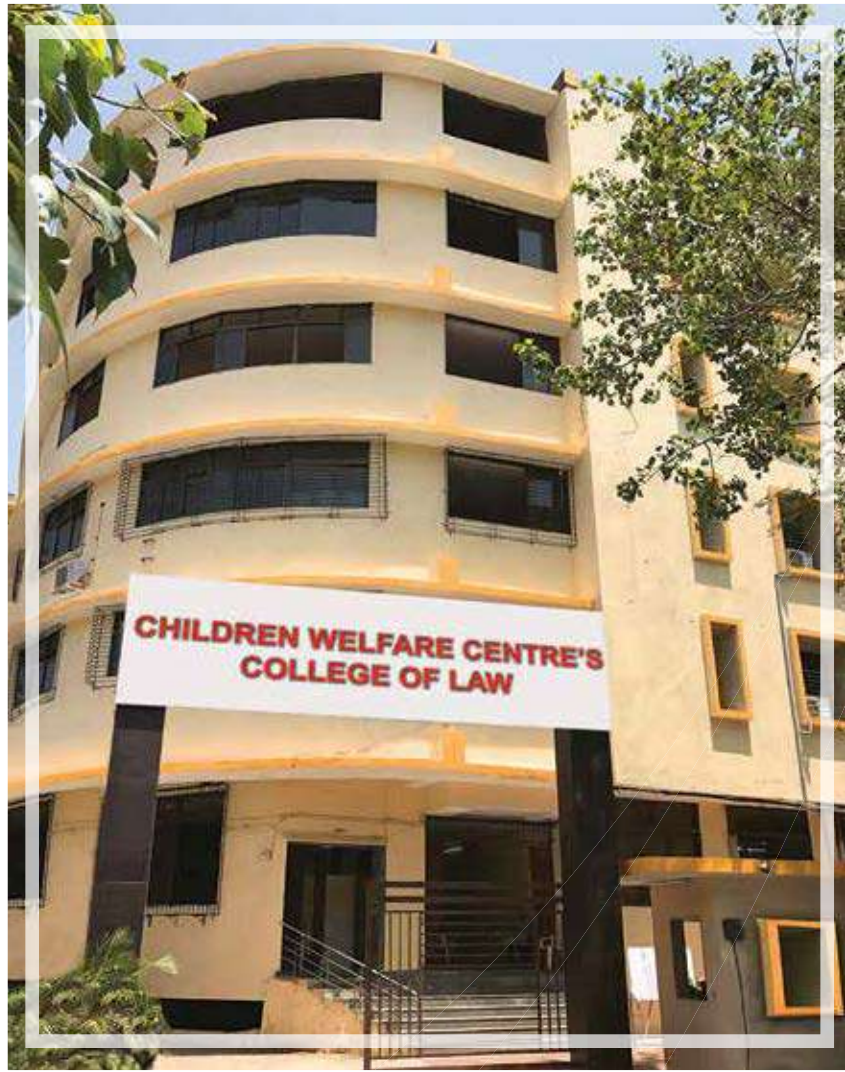

College Infrastructure

Children Welfare Centre's College of Law is situated at Malad West, off Marve Road, with easy connectivity to the various Courts, and offices of major law firms in Mumbai.

Children Welfare Centre's College of Law infrastructure includes a state of the art Moot Court, a well equipped library & E-Library, computer laboratory, fully furnished ICT enabled classrooms supplemented by auditorium, seminar rooms and a conference room. The Closed Circuit T.V monitors the college corridors and library to ensure a secured environment. The College has medical facilities to attend to minor emergencies. The College also has a well equipped canteen.

Computer Lab / E-Library

Computers assist the law students for academic pursuits as well as for research for Moot Presentations and Research Projects. The college has subscribed legal data base like SSC online, Nlist-Inflibnet etc.



ICT enabled Classrooms

The college has state of the art ICT - enabled Classrooms to employ the latest teaching methods.



Gymnasium

A well equipped Gym is set up for the students who are trained under the guidance of an expert instructor.

Library

The library is well stocked and wi-fi enabled. Designed for comfort, it provides a conducive environment



for research. The students have access to legal and non-legal journals, as well as subject related reference programs, which support and supplement the syllabus. Various International / National law journals, law reports and magazines are subscribed by the College and are available to the students. The E-Library has electronic resources and data bases accessible to students through links. Use of laptops is allowed in the library.



Conference Room

Student presentations and staff meetings are conducted in the conference room of the college which is well resourced with a round table, sound system and projector.

Reading Room

The reading room serves as a quite, conducive space for students to engage in focused reading, studying, research and self reflection.

Moot Court

The art of advancing argument needs to be mastered by a law student. The Moot Court provides the perfect environment for the same. The College holds three in-house Moot-Court competitions: (a) The Senior Moot Court Competition (b) The Freshers' Moot Court Competition and (c) The Common Moot Court Competition. Learning through one's own experiences builds the confidence among the students.



Legal Aid Clinic

According to Section 2 (c) of Legal Services Authority Act, 1987 "Legal Services" includes the rendering of any service in the conduct of any case or other legal proceeding before any court or other authority or tribunal and the giving of advice on any legal matter.

With the motive of rendering legal service, the Legal Aid Clinic was inaugurated on 20th January, 2018 at Children Welfare Centre Law College by Yatin Game, Secretary of Mumbai District Legal Service Authority, Mrs Nanda P Bandchodhe, Secretary of Mumbai District Legal Service Authority and Adv. Sasi Nair, Panel Advocate of Mumbai District Legal Service Authority.

Under the aegis of Legal Aid Clinic, it has been decided to hold legal literacy camps, training sessions in collaboration with NGOs for women within the campus and also seminars and discussions for the students. An initiative has also been taken to set up a helpline for free legal aid.

Campus Activities

The College encourages students to participate in various curricular and co-curricular activities, some of which are as follows:

- Seminars, legal literacy camps, workshops, and legal aid clinic.
- Study tours to learn and understand socio-economic-legal and administrative issues.
- Legal research, essays on socio-legal and eco-legal topics.
- Visits to various Courts, including Supreme Court, Bombay High Court, Rashtrapati Bhavan, Parliament House, State Human Rights Commission Office, Vidhan Bhavan (Maharashtra Legislature) and Judicial Academy etc.
- The College conducts Moot Court, Debates, Elocution Competitions etc and also motivates students to participate in various Intra and Inter Collegiate Competitions
- Law students need to understand that protecting the human rights of all citizens, including prisoners, is binding on the State. Hence, the college organizes visits to prisons to sensitize the students about life in prisons.
- Para-Legal Training Programme.

DLE dept. offers several extension work projects to the students such as skill development, industry orientation, career guidance, survey report etc. All the students on completion of 120 hours of work and after submission of project report are awarded 10 additional marks at the final exams.

Para - Legal Training Programme

The college in collaboration with District Legal Services Authority conducts para-legal training programmes. On completion of the programme students are awarded with volunteer cards which enables them to work as para-legal volunteers under the District Legal Services Authority. The volunteers are entrusted with the objective of educating every citizen to enable him or her to be aware of the right to live with human dignity, enjoying all the constitutionally and statutorily guaranteed rights and performing the duties and discharging the obligations as per Law.



Visit to Jails, Courts, Judicial Academies and Legal Firms

The college conducts visits to various Courts including Supreme Court of India, High Court of Bombay, Judicial Academy, Various legal Firms, the Parliament House and Houses of legislatures to provide first hand knowledge to the students.

Self Defence Training Programme

The College conducts Self Defence Training Programme for female students every semester. The programme aims at focusing on strategies like awareness, risk reduction, risk avoidance and hands-on self-defence techniques.



Cultural Activities

The college conducts its annual fest 'Indradhanush' each year in order to identify the hidden talents among the students. The college aims at enabling overall development of its students in Theatre, Dance, Literary and Fine Arts, as well as Music. From the beginning of every academic year, students are encouraged to perform on stage. They are also encouraged to participate in various intra and intercollegiate events and competitions.

Annual Sports Meet

A Healthy body in a Healthy Mind holds good for the law students as well. The College organizes both indoor and outdoor sports events on Sports Day to achieve this goal.

The College Magazine

The College Magazine 'Percept' is published annually. Contributions in the form of legal essays, short stories, legal analytical articles, riddles, poems, sketches and cartoons are invited from the students as well as the teachers. Representation of all languages is encouraged. The achievement of the teachers and students are significantly projected in the annual magazine. The editorial committee looks after the publication of the magazine.





Committees, Clubs & Councils

Students' Council

The student council is formed in accordance with the Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016 to look after the welfare of the students and to promote and co-ordinate the extra curricular activities of different Student's Committees. The Council shall not engage in any political activities.

Anti - Ragging Committee

The College has established an Anti Ragging Committee on the campus as per the guidelines given in UGC Regulations on curbing the menace of ragging in Higher Educational Institutions.

Student Grievance Redressal Committee (SGRC)

The College Grievance Redressal Committee is constituted to redress all grievances of students in the college as per the directive of the Government of Maharashtra and University of Mumbai.

Women Development Committee & Internal Complaints Committee

As per the directions received from the University of Mumbai, Women Development Committee and Internal Complaints Committee.

Attendance Committee

The College has formed the Attendance Committee as per University Ordinance O.6086.

Various other Committees are also constituted as per Maharashtra Public Universities Act 2016. There are CDC Committee, IQAC Committee, Admission Committee, Examination Committee, Unfair Means Committee, Alumni and Placement Committee, Magazine Committee, Cultural and Sports Committee, DLLE Committee, Vishakha Committee, Moot Court Committee and Legal Aid Committee, Maintenance Cell, Electoral Literacy Club, Academic Monitoring Committee, SC-ST Committee, Student Grievance Redressal Committee etc are also functioning in this college.

Swami Vivekananda Yuva Suraksha Yojana (Student Group Insurance)

The Swami Vivekananda Yuva Suraksha Yojana is an important welfare initiative aimed at providing financial security and support to students during unforeseen emergencies. Included as part of the annual fee structure for the academic year 2026-27, the scheme reflects the institution's commitment towards student well-being and safety alongside academic development. By offering insurance coverage to students, the college ensures a sense of protection and reassurance for both students and parents, reinforcing its holistic approach to education and student care.



Placements & Internship Facilitation



Placement Cell

The Placement Cell of Children Welfare Centre's College of Law constantly helps students gain necessary information, services, skills and contacts to help them achieve their career goals. Seminars by eminent professionals from various fields are arranged in this regard.

The Equal Opportunities Cell

Children Welfare Centre's College of Law is committed to promoting inclusivity, equality, and a supportive academic environment for all students. The Cell strives to ensure that every student, irrespective of social, economic, cultural, or physical background, receives equal access to educational opportunities and institutional support. Through awareness programmes, guidance initiatives, and student-centric activities, the Cell works towards fostering dignity, non-discrimination, and an atmosphere of mutual respect within the institution.

Minimum Period of Internship

Each registered student will have to complete minimum of 12 weeks internship for the three years course and 20 weeks in case of the five years course under any NGO, Trial, and Appellate Advocates, Judiciary, Legal Regulatory authorities, Legislatures and Parliament, or other Legal Functionaries, Market Institutions, Law Firms, Companies, Local Self Government and other such bodies as the University shall stipulate, where law is practiced either in action or in dispute resolution or in management during the entire period of law course, provided that internship in any year cannot be for a continuous period of more than four weeks. This is a requirement for every student once in the entire academic period with Trial and Appellate Advocates.

Each student shall keep an internship diary in such form as may be stipulated by the University concerned and the same shall be evaluated by the Guide for the internship and also by a core faculty member of the staff each time. The total marks shall be assessed in the final semester of the course in the 4th Clinical course as stipulated under the Rules in Schedule II.

[Items 25, Schedule III, Rules of Legal education 2008]

As per the Bar Council of India Circular No. 5/2014 dated 11.09.2014 student can only take internship during the vacation. No internship is allowed during the academic session.

5 Years Integrated Degree Course

Admission Guidelines:

EDUCATIONAL QUALIFICATIONS:

- (a) An applicant who has successfully completed Higher Secondary School course (10+2) or equivalent course from an Institute in Maharashtra State (such as 11+1, A level in Senior secondary School Leaving Certificate course) from a recognized Board in India or Outside or from Secondary Board or equivalent, constituted or recognized by the Union or by a State Government or from any equivalent institution from a Foreign Country recognized by the Government of that Country for the purpose of issue of qualifying certificate on successful completion of the course Examination and having its Institution in the State of Maharashtra, with minimum of 45% marks in Aggregate for OPEN, EWS (Economically Weaker Section) & Outside Maharashtra State candidates (OMS) i.e. All India Candidates, (SC & ST Category candidates belonging to Maharashtra State with minimum 40% marks in Aggregate and VJNT, SBC and OBC Category Candidates belonging to Maharashtra State with minimum 42% marks in Aggregate).
- (b) The applicants who have obtained 10+2 Higher Secondary Pass certificate or First Degree Certificate after processing studies in Distance or Correspondence method are eligible for the course. The applicants who have obtained 10+2 through Open University system directly without having any Basic Qualification are not eligible.
- (c) The qualifications of 10th (SSC), 12th (HSC) (10+2) may be obtained through any mode (distance /correspondence / open schooling method).
- (d) The Applicant/s must obtain basic qualification for admission to Five Year degree course for which the Basic Qualification shall be 10th(SSC) which shall be required to be followed by +2(HSC). Further provided that, the candidates who are appearing / appeared for the qualifying examination (regular examination of that Academic Year) are also

eligible to apply for the Entrance Examination. Such candidate will be eligible for admission only if they produce the provisional / Degree / certificate of the qualifying examination and the mark lists of all parts / attempts of the qualifying examination at the time of admission.

- (e) The applicant should have appeared and cleared CET conducted by the Competent Authority. This condition is precedent for Admission.

Eligibility for admission of candidate who have studied through Distance / Correspondence / Open University method.

As per Circular No. LE Cir : 02/2010 dated 20/12/2010 & No. BCI:D: 1823/2010 from Bar Council of India, the following rules are laid down regarding admission to LLB course.

The applicant who obtains +2 Higher Secondary passing certificate or First Year Degree certificate after pursuing studies in distance or correspondence mode shall also be considered as eligible for admission in the integrated five years course or three years course as the case may be. However applicants who have completed 10+2 or graduation / post graduation through open University system directly without having any basic qualifications for pursuing such studies are not eligible for admission in law courses. Further, no candidate will be admitted to LL.B. Course having any degree contrary to University Grants Commission Act and Regulation and also Bar Council of India, Rules of Legal Education- 2008. Students who are taking admission under the eligibility category are required to comply with all the necessary documents within 6 months from the date of admission for issuing the provisional certificates by the University of Mumbai, failing which their admission will be treated as cancelled as per University norms for that year and accordingly they will not be allowed to take admission for the next year.

Note : Subject to change as per the guidelines of State CET Cell

ADMISSION ELIGIBILITY

- a) Candidate should be a Graduate in any Faculty of any University in Maharashtra established by an act of Parliament or by a State Legislature or an equivalent National Institution recognized as a Deemed to be University or Foreign University recognized as equivalent to the status of an Indian University by an Authority competent to declare equivalence, With Minimum of 45% marks in aggregate in qualifying examination (That is 45% marks for all the parts of the Degree Examination taken together) in case of the candidates belonging to OPEN Category, ALL INDIA CANDIDATURE (OMS) and EWS.40% marks in aggregate in qualifying examination (That is 40% marks for all the parts of the Degree Examination taken together) in case of Candidates belonging to SC & ST Categories belonging to Maharashtra State. 42% marks in aggregate in qualifying examination (That is 42% marks for all the parts of the Degree Examination taken together) in case of candidates belonging to VJNT, SBC and OBC Categories belonging to Maharashtra State.
- (b) An applicant/s who has passed the U.G. degree and 2/3 years P.G. degree from University in Maharashtra mentioned in (a) after processing the studies in the pattern 12th+3+2/3 with minimum marks as stated in (a): Post Graduate diploma will not be considered as Post Graduate Degree. Provided that, the applicants who have obtained +2 Higher Secondary Pass Certificate or First Degree Certificate by Distance or Correspondence method shall also be considered as eligible for Three Year Law Course. Further provided that, no candidate from the open University having a degree contrary of the U.G.C. Act and regulations and contrary to Rules of Legal Education shall be eligible.
- (c) The qualifications of 10th (SSC), 12th (HSC)

(10+2) and Graduation may be obtained through any mode (Distance / Correspondence / Open schooling method).

- (d) The Applicant/s must obtain basic qualification for admission to Three Year Law course for which the Basic Qualification shall be 12th (HSC) which shall be required to be followed by three year Graduation. Further provided that, the candidates who are appearing / appeared for the qualifying examination UG or PG (regular examination of that Academic Year) are also eligible to apply for the Entrance Examination. Such candidates become eligible for admission only if they produce the provisional / Degree certificate of the qualifying examination and the mark lists of all parts of qualifying examination at the time of CAP Application form filling.

EXPLANATION:

1. Candidates who have passed 10th (SSC) & 12th (HSC through Regular Mode/ Distance Mode / By filling Form-17 / NIOS (The National Institute of Open Schooling formerly known as Open School NOS) or equivalent qualifying examination for HSC + 3 Year Graduate examination & or 2 Year Post Graduate examination through Regular Mode/ Distance Mode / Correspondence Mode/ Open University / Deemed University / IDOL(Institute of Distance & Open Learning) are eligible for LL.B-3 CET 2025 Examination, provided their Education Pattern should be 10+2+3 (SSC+HSC+3 Year Graduate Degree) i.e. 10th +12th + 3 Year Graduation and or 2/3 Year Post Graduation.
2. Three-year graduation degree in any faculty issued by any University recognised by UGC and following a 10+2+3 education pattern is a must to appear in MAH-LL.B.- 3 Year CET 2026 & for admission of three-year law course.
3. The qualifications of 10th, 12th (10+2) and Graduation may be obtained through any mode (distance / correspondence / open schooling method). Such candidates are eligible for LL.B.-3 Year CET 2026 Examination.
4. Candidate obtained bachelor degree from any open University with Preparatory examination

- without passing HSC are not eligible for LL.B.-3 year CET 2026 examination & admission of LL.B.-3 Year Course.
5. Candidate should have completed any 3 Year bachelor degree from any open University (recognized by UGC) after passing 12th Std. (HSC). Such candidates are eligible for LL.B.-3 year CET 2026.
 6. Those candidates who have passed 12th Std. (HSC) after Graduation and or Post Graduation are not eligible for LL.B.-3 Year CET 2026 & admission of LL.B.-3 Year Course since their educational qualification is Non-Sequential.  7. Basic qualification for admission into Three Year Law Course will be 12th (10+2) which shall be required to be followed by Three-Years graduation and or two or three Years Post Graduation.

Candidate seeking admission into Three Year Law course must have passed class 12th (HSC) as it is the Basic Qualification for the 3 Year Law course without passing which, he or she cannot be considered eligible for LL.B.-3 year CET 2026 Examination. Preparatory Examination of the Open Universities cannot be considered equivalent to 10+2 (HSC).

Graduation degree + 12th passed. Such Non Sequential qualification will not be considered for LL.B.-3 year CET. Candidates who have obtained such non sequential qualification are not eligible for LL.B.-3 Year CET Examination & admission of LL.B.-3 Year Course.

GENERAL NORMS FOR LL.M. COURSE :

The LL.M. Course is intended to produce Academicians and Lawyers of competence and expertise, as it is imperative that the students should have an in-depth knowledge not only of the Concepts and basic Principles of law, but also of Social, Political and Economic aspects of law, as well as dynamics of law.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA:

- (a) Admission of the students shall be made in accordance with the merits at the LL.M. Entrance Examination and marks secured for LL.B. Degree
- (b) MUM-CET Minimum Qualifying Marks :
General Category : 40 Marks
Reserved Category : 30 Marks
- (c) Candidates seeking LL.M. Admission are required to appear for CET conducted by Department of Law, University of Mumbai. The minimum qualification for a candidate of general category applying for admission to the LL.M. Course is a LL.B. degree of University of Mumbai or a degree recognized as equivalent thereto. However, candidates belonging to reserved category may apply for LL.M. Course with a pass class.
- (d) Students who have passed LL.B. Degree from other than Mumbai University are required to obtain Provisional Statement of Eligibility Certificate from Eligibility Section. Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Bhavan, Santacruz (E), Vidyanagari, Mumbai-400098. Such candidates are required to pay fee for document verification as prescribed

by Mumbai University from time to time for confirmation of validity of their certificates of their previous University and confirmation of eligibility to their LL.M.

Library

The college library has a reading hall for students. The Library has a vast collection of books and journals on a variety of subjects.

Timings: The library remains open from 8.00 a.m. to 10.00 p.m. on all working days, except Sundays and public holidays.



Issue / Return:

One book at a time is given for a week for home reading.

Research documents, periodicals and other materials are available for current reading.

Students participating in Moot Court competitions get more than one book at a time for reference.

Fine Rs. 5/- per day, if book is not returned.

Library card is compulsory for home issue and reading hall usage.

Library Collection

The Library Counter Section includes all standard text books, bare acts and question paper sets. The recent issues of the law reports and journals are displayed at the counter.

Reference and general section has all non-text books arranged subject wise. They include both legal and non legal books, dictionaries, encyclopedias, central acts, manuals, standard commentaries, treatises, biographies etc. from the reference and general collection.

Library Rules

The students must refrain from disturbing other readers in the library.

Students should maintain complete silence in the reading hall. They should switch off their cell phones or keep them on silent mode.

Students should bring their belongings to the library at their own risk. If such things are lost, the library staff will not be held responsible.

The students should immediately inform the Librarian of any loss, damage of book borrowed by him / her on the library card.

Students should contact the Librarian for any problem. They should not argue with the staff on duty.

Any matter not covered by these rules will rest at the absolute discretion of the Principal and Management.

Violation of these rules shall invite disciplinary action.

Other Facilities

The college magazine 'Percept' records the academic and non academic events held during the academic year. The faculty and the students of the college also express their legal innovative ideas through the magazine.

Book Bank : Under this scheme, set of text books are made available for home reading to needy and deserving students.



The Library : Current reading facility is also provided to the ex-students.

Current Awareness : Newly purchased books are displayed at the counter and list of the same is put up on the notice board.

Article alert : Subject wise list of Journals and Articles is displayed quarterly on the notice board. Referring to the list, students can read original journal articles on various legal issues.

E Books and legal Database link are available on college website in the library section.



Students should not invite an outsider to the college premises, classrooms, library, canteen gymkhana, or gymnasium.

Students must not associate themselves with any activity not authorized by the Principal. Serious action shall be taken against the students found organizing or participating in such unauthorized activities. No student shall be allowed to take active part in any of the current political activities.

No student shall communicate any information or write about matters dealing with the College administration to the press or any social or political organization. Students are expected to take care of College property and to help in keeping the premises clean.

Damage to the property of the College, e.g. spitting, disfiguring walls, doors or breaking furniture, fittings, glasses is a breach of discipline and will attract severe punishment. Students should not leave their books, valuables and other belongings in the class rooms. The college is not responsible for the lost property of students.

Students are not permitted to park two wheelers or four wheelers in the college premises. Students requiring certificates or testimonials in regards to their performance and progress in a course should apply to the professor-in-charge.

If, for any reason, the continuance of a student in the College is, in the opinion of the Principal detrimental to the best interest of the college, the principal may ask such student to leave the College without assigning any reason thereof.

Students joining the college are bound by the Rules and Regulations of the College. Students receiving Government or College scholarships or any remission in fees must note that the grant and continuance thereof are subject to good behaviour, regular attendance, satisfactory progress and good result at College and University exams. Students using unfair means at examination shall not be readmitted to the College. Matters not covered by the existing rules will

Attendance as per University

Ordinance. 0.6086

(Circular No. UG/01 OF 2014 dated 5th May, 2014)

- 1) There shall be the attendance Committee, for smooth conduct of this ordinance, in every College/ Institute / Department of the University comprising of at least three members (to be nominated from other departments in case of the University having less than 3 teachers) the Vice-Principal / Senior Teacher (Convener) and at least two more teachers ensuring representation of the concerned faculties, nominated by the Principal / Director / Head.

2) Every bonafide learner shall ordinarily be allowed to keep terms for the given semester in a program of his enrolment only if he fulfils at least seventy five percent (75%) of the attendance taken as an average of the total number of lectures, practical's, tutorials etc. wherein short and/or long excursions / field visits /study tours organized by the college and supervised by the teachers as envisaged in the syllabus shall be credited to his/ her attendance for the total number of periods which are otherwise delivered on the material day/s. Further it is mandatory for every learner to have minimum 50% attendance for each course and average has to be 75%.

3) The same ratio shall be applied for computing the attendance of the learners by crediting the number of periods which are missed while participating in an extra-curricular / co-curricular activity / competition / camp /workshop / convention / symposium / seminar etc. where the said learner is officially representing the college / University / District / State / Country with the permission of the Principal / Director / Head of the college / Institute / University Department or by the direction of the University officer as the case may be wherein for the purpose of computing the average attendance the periods missed for what is envisaged here-in-above, at Sr No.2, shall be deemed to have been attended by the said learner.

4) Without prejudice to what is stated here-in-above the Principal/Director / Head of the concerned College / Institute / Department of the University shall be the competent authority to condone the absentee of any learner further up to additional 25%, if deemed fit and on recommendation of the attendance committee of the said College / Institute / Department of the University, wherein it is mandatory on the said committee to do natural justice by giving personal hearing to every learner falling short of minimum attendance for keeping



terms and recommending case by case to the competent authority having verified the genuineness and gravity of the problem that justifies the learner to remain absent, which generally shall be limited to his / her own sickness, sickness of his parent, death of his / her parent etc. supported by valid evidence, documentary or otherwise.

The college has formed the attendance committee as per the University Ordinance O.6086

Leave of Absence

In case students are not able to attend lectures and/or tutorials for a period exceeding a week in a term, they should take prior permission for such absence from the Principal of the College.

Absence on medical or other grounds, which is given to the satisfaction of the Principal, may be considered for a satisfactory reason for absence from lectures or tutorials. Yet at the time of granting the terms to a student, his/ her class work and other academic inputs would be considered to be of paramount importance, hence, a student may not be granted his/ her terms even if he/she explains his/ her absence on medical or other grounds. Absence should be with prior permission; in case it is due to unforeseen circumstances, an application duly supported by a medical certificate in the case of illness or duly supported by other satisfactory evidence in the case of other reasons, must reach the Principal within a week of such occasion of absence.



Documents Issued By The College



Identity card

Students should retain possession of their ID Card while in the College Premises and produce the same whenever required by any member of the College staff

Every student must display his/her ID to the security personnel at the gate failing which he or she may not be allowed to enter the college premises

Every student must at all times display the valid identity card issued by the college Authorities

Transfer / Migration

Students seeking transfer from one college to another during the academic year are required to submit a Transfer Certificate and the mark sheet showing marks obtained in the First Term Examination conducted by the former college. In the event of a student getting transferred from one college to another within the University of Mumbai, the credits earned at the end of the first semester examination in the original college, shall be binding on the Learner and on the college to which the Learner is transferred. Further a student migrating from another University to this University for joining the Second year course will not be required to appear and pass the First Year Examination of this University.

Transfer Certificate

The College shall be entitled to charge a fee of Rs. 200/- for issuing Transfer Certificate upon submission of the transfer Certificate request demand of necessary documents.

A student leaving one college to join another should have attended 75% of the lectures / tutorials held during the term. A Transfer Certificate shall not be granted except for reasons which appear to be sufficient and except with the written permission of the Principal of the College which the student wants to leave. The application / or request for transfer certificate shall be made by the student without unnecessary delay through the Principal of the College to which they wish to be transferred.

Rules and Regulations for Railway Concession

Students will be issued railway concession forms for season tickets from the station nearest to their residence and Malad station. Residential address given on the admission form will be taken as valid for the concession.

The Age Limit is upto 25 years to avail the railway concession. The student is required to submit the attested proof of residence.
